Ex Libris Sigmund Freud: An Exhibit of Books from the Library of Sigmund Freud



Hammer Building,
Lobby Level & Lower Level 1

Sigmund Freud's early fascination with dreams, hypnotism and sexuality are evident in a collection of books, papers and letters that were once owned by the legendary psychoanalyst and are now part of a Health Sciences Library special exhibit.

To commemorate the 150th anniversary of his birth in 1856, over 25 volumes from Freud's personal library are now on display as part of an exhibit by Archives and Special Collections at the Health Sciences Library. Included are a volume inscribed by the great French neurologist, Jean Martin Charcot, to his pupil Freud, and works showing Freud's distinctive margin notes—China marker was his preferred mark-up tool—one of which is a succinct "Dumm!"

Columbia University has housed part of the library of Sigmund Freud since 1978, and this collection consists of 770 titles dating from 1554 to 1938 and is rich in 19th and early 20th century psychiatry, neurology and psychoanalysis.

Also on display are several Freud items obtained independently of the Health Sciences

Library's main Freud collection, including a manuscript page of Freud's *Totem and Tabu*, and a letter from Freud to the émigré Russian psychoanalyst, Nikolai Ossipov.

The Freud Library was transferred to the Health Sciences Library in 1978, though it remains the property of the Psychiatric Institute.

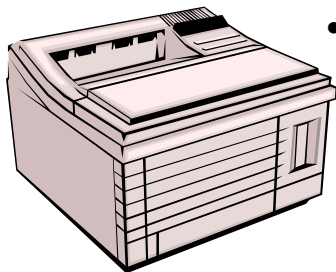

- You can use an email program like Outlook or Thunderbird and still access email from other computers with CubMail. To do so:
 - Set up your email program as an IMAP account.
 - You will have two sets of email folders; one stores locally on your computer, the other are your IMAP folders (on Columbia's servers)
 - You can drag email messages from a local folder to an IMAP folder (and vice versa) if you need to view the message from CubMail later on.

Easy File Transfer through Cunix

Did you know that if you forget a USB key or CD and want to copy files from one computer to another, you can use your space on the Columbia servers (Cunix) to upload and download files from other computers?

- PC owners can use WinSCP:

- Macintosh owners can use Fugu:
<http://www.columbia.edu/acis/software/fugu>

These programs are installed on the Library and PH17 computers, but to access your Cunix account from other systems you will need to use the same programs or any other file transfer program that uses secure telnet (SSH v2) to connect.

Keep in mind that there is a 40MB limit on your Cunix space.
